## "Explanation of Terms"

Alignment	Any straight line on which a body of uniformed Pathfinders is formed or is to
	form.
Blank File	A file without a center and rear rank Pathfinder or without a center rank
	Pathfinder.
	A blank file is the second from the left in threes and the third from the left in
	twos.
Body	A unit, club, division or larger designation.
Cadence	The Uniform rhythm or time in which a movement is executed.
Column	A formation of elements, bodies of marching Pathfinders, one behind the
	other on parallel and successive alignments at such a distance from one
	another when formed to an angle of $90^{0}$ to either flank will bring them into
	line with the three paces interval between each. In a club column, the
	Pathfinders in each unit are one behind the other, with the units abreast of
	each other.
<b>Close Column</b>	A column with distance reduced to suit, requirements.
<b>Close Order</b>	The normal distance between ranks in file.
<b>Column of Route</b>	A column of three with not more than three abreast in any part of the
	column including officers and super-numeraries. The normal formation for
	uniformed individuals marching closed up on a road.
<b>Columns of Threes</b>	A column with its officers and super-numeraries maintaining their
	places except for the officer in command who places himself at the head of
	the unit or sub unit.
Covering	Aligning oneself directly behind the Pathfinder to one's immediate front
	which maintaining the correct distance.
	The act of a body placing itself directly behind another body.
Depth	The space occupied by a body of uniformed Pathfinders from front to rear.
<b>Directing Body</b>	The body, unit or subordinate unit on which the direction, pace an alignment
	or relative positions of the several parts of a formation depend.
Distance	The space between elements, Pathfinders and bodies of Pathfinders, from
	front to rear.
Dressing	The act of aligning oneself with and covering others within a body of troops.
Element	An individual Pathfinder or body of Pathfinders forming a part of the next
	larger group.

File	A front rank Pathfinder with his coverer or coverers. A column that has a
	front of only one element.
Flank	Either side of a body of Pathfinders as opposed to its front and rear.
Forming	Method of changing formation and/or direction.
Formation	The arrangement of the elements of a Pathfinder drill formation in any
	prescribed manner.
Front	The direction in which Pathfinders are facing or moving at any given time. It
	is also the advanced position when the parade has been initially dressed.
Frontage	The extent of ground covered laterally by a body of Pathfinders measured
	from flank to flank.
Incline	A diagonal movement by which ground is gained to the front and flank
Inner Flank	That nearer the directing flank and serving as a pivot when a body is
	changing its direction.
Interval	The lateral space between elements of the same alignment measured from
	flank to flank. Intervals are measured from elbow to elbow.
	Normal Interval, each pathfinder is allotted a lateral space of 60 cm in two
	ranks: in three ranks this space is at arms length with the fist clenched.
<b>Close Interval</b>	This lateral space is at elbow length with the right arm raised and flexed
	horizontally.
Line	Pathfinders formed on the same alignment. In a club line the Pathfinders in
	each unit are abreast of each other.
	A formation in which the elements are side by side or abreast of each other.
Markers	Personnel employed in certain circumstances to mark points on which to
	direct a movement or by which to regulate a formation or alignment.
Open Order	An increased distance between ranks for ceremonial or inspection purposes.
Outer Flank	The opposite to the inner or directing flank (often known a reversed flank).
Pace or Step	A measurement of distance on foot.
Quick Time	The cadence or timing of counts or paces per minute.
Rank	A line of Pathfinders side by side, only one element in depth.
Single File	Pathfinders one behind the other on a frontage of one Pathfinder at normal
	marching distance.
Supernumeracy	The extra rank, fourth rank in three ranks or third rank in two ranks formed
Rank	by senior Pathfinders of a body of Pathfinders.
Wheeling	A movement by which a body of Pathfinders changes direction each rank or
	file pivoting on the inner flank by retaining its dressing
